Present - Day Applications of Ramayana's Values.


(i) Ethical leadership in Governance and institutions.

⇒ Applying these values enhances emotional intelligence, communication skills, and empathy - qualities that international universities emphasize for global citizenship.


(iv) Developing character and moral strength among youth.
