She believed that truth always wins in the end. Her life teaches us - courage, during suffering; patience during hardship and loyalty towards values. ↴

Lakshman, Hanuman and Bharat - Devotion and Sacrifice.

Ramayana also shows the power of true devotion and friendship. Lakshman, Ram's younger brother chose to live in the forest with him for fourteen years,

Ravana - The Fall of Ego and Adharma.
